## Navy commander insists Canada should buy unmodified submarines

The commander of the Royal Canadian Navy says his "perfect" scenario would be to get an order into an existing production line so that Canada can quickly get its hands on a sub.

OTTAWA — Vice-Admiral Angus Topshee said he has made it clear he wants "no changes" to the design of the submarines Canada intends to buy, due to the highly complex nature of the war machines.

"I have been as explicit as possible that there are no changes to the design," Topshee said Wednesday.

"If you have ever looked at submarine engineering, every change requires a full reconsideration because anything that goes wrong is potentially existential. When something is designed to sink and come back to the surface, you don't want to really re-engineer parts of that system."

Topshee made the comments at a defence procurement conference in the nation's capital, put on by the Canadian Global Affairs Institute think tank.

The commander of the Royal Canadian Navy says his "perfect" scenario would be to get an order into an existing production line so that Canada can quickly get its hands on a sub originally designed for use by Norway, Germany or South Korea.

"If the power is different on that submarine, then I will buy all my sailors adapters," he joked.

The plan is to build maintenance facilities on both coasts with Canadian steel and labour, and the boats will need a skilled domestic support workforce to sustain them.

Prime Minister Mark Carney toured one of the new Hanwha Oceans subs in its shipyard in South Korea last month, and a German submarine in August at a shipyard in Kiel.

The Carney government's first budget books more than \$80 billion in defence spending through to the end of the decade. It does not include money for submarines in the fiscal plan — raising questions about when the government plans to announce a winning bidder.

The government is also working behind the scenes to reform how it makes major military purchases.

Doug Guzman started his new job Wednesday as head of the Defence Investment Agency, a new government office meant to centralize

and speed up major military purchasing decisions.

Senior bureaucrats said at the conference Wednesday that Ottawa's new defence spending plans have drawn expressions of interest from investors with large amounts of capital, such as banks and pension funds, and that the government is trying to shed red tape so projects can move at a quicker pace.

The federal government is also expected to release a new defence investment strategy in the coming weeks.



**Rear-Admiral Robinson** discussed **HMCS CORNER BROOK** operations between 2007 and 2009, where in addition to normal fleet duties. In recognition of its outstanding contribution to Canadian sovereignty, CORNER BROOK was awarded the Canadian Armed Forces Unit Commendation in 2008.



**Commander Isabelle** discussed **HMCS Windsor** operations between 2014 and 2018, where in addition to normal fleet duties, it deployed for 133 days on Op Projection Euro-Atlantic, the first time a Canadian submarine was operational in the Mediterranean in more than four decades. The year before Windsor deployed for NATO's Joint Warrior and Trident Juncture training engagements along with joint training with Canadian Special Operations Forces personnel.

## Submarine returns home to Vancouver Island after northern expedition.

Families of submariners waited with signs and Timbits on Sunday morning as HMCS Corner Brook arrived home after a nearly two-month operation in the north Pacific and western Arctic.

Guided by a navy tugboat, the submarine made its way into a pier at Ogden Point, where Lauren Tarr welcomed her boyfriend, Sailor 1st Class Zack Davidson, with a kiss.

Davidson, who had won the traditional raffle to exit the boat before its first officers to greet their partner, said it felt good to breathe fresh air for a change.

“I’m pretty jazzed,” he said.

Tarr said she was most looking forward to playing Davidson the recently released new Taylor Swift album *The Life of a Showgirl*, noting that submariners don’t have WiFi or cell service underwater, so he hadn’t had the chance to hear it yet.

“We have a lot to catch up on,” she said.

The submarine was quickly cleaned before welcoming guests aboard as part of CFB Esquimalt’s Defence on the Dock, where the public had a chance to tour HMCS Corner Brook and HMCS Vancouver.

Corner Brook played a role in Canadian Armed Forces Arctic exercises, working with Canadian and U.S. navy and coast guard vessels to help defend the continent as part of Operation LATITUDE.

“It’s been going on for a few years as part of our routine commitment to defending Canada and deterring threats in the area,” said Lieutenant-Commander Clark Hubbard, commanding officer of Corner Brook, who was in charge of 58 sailors during the journey, four of them women.

The operation was the first command for Hubbard, who said they encountered rough seas but managed them well because of the stability submarines have underwater during stormy weather.

Next up for the submarine is a short work period, where the boat will be modernized and some small repairs will be made, before she continues performing exercises, said Captain Alex Kooiman, commander of the Canadian Submarine Force.

Kooiman said tensions between Canada and the U.S. haven't changed the relationship between their militaries as they work together to protect their waters.

"We have always been ready to go," he said. "Regardless of what the outside world looks like, the world inside a submarine doesn't change."

On board Corner Brook, naval combat systems engineering officer Nick Culbert said he became a submariner because he wanted to experience the most technically complicated systems possible. "I was looking for a challenge that didn't exist on the surface ships."

Culbert showed off the torpedoes aboard the boat, noting that just one can sink any ship on the water by detonating beneath it, causing the ship's spine to tear in half.



The 12 trainees aboard Corner Brook during Operation LATITUDE slept amongst the torpedoes in the weapons stowage compartment.

Despite the cramped quarters, Culbert said submariners are treated with the best food in the navy, adding that he once ate filet mignon and crab legs for dinner multiple days in a row while at sea.

"Food is morale on a submarine," he said. "We don't get to see the sun, so we get good food."

**Jacob Lloyd** - Passed away on Thursday, December 18, 2025 at the age of 81 years in Valley Regional Hospital, Kentville, N.S.

He was born in Altona, Manitoba on September 27, 1944. He is survived by his wife, Barbara; sons, Nathan (Nicola Holdsworth) and Joel; grandchildren, Samson, Fiona, James, Baker, and Mary. He was very proud of his family and their accomplishments.

Lloyd retired from the Royal Canadian Navy in the Canadian Submarine Squadron as Lieutenant Commander after a career that spanned 33 years. During his time in the Navy, he served on surface ships, and for a large part of his naval career, he was a submariner. Lloyd did an exchange with submarines in England in 1982.

He had many stories to tell from his time in Britain, from going to the 24 hour car race in Le Mans to dealing with British council bylaws when Lloyd thought a tree needed pruning. He learned, after the fact, you get approval first, then prune.

Lloyd earned his Mechanical Engineering degree at TUNS in 1976.

After his retirement from the Navy, he decided he wanted to grow tomatoes. Consequently, he and Barb bought a tree fruit farm in Waterville, N.S. Lloyd enjoyed working in the orchard, learning and developing techniques to grow quality apples, pears, and cherries. Lloyd was a grower member of Scotian Gold. He had found his passion, not in growing tomatoes, but in his orchard, Apples and Spice.

His honest and forth right approach to life and genuine caring for others will be missed. In keeping with Lloyd's wishes, there is no service at this time. A Celebration of Lloyd's Life will be held at a later date. Donations may be made to a charity of choice. (Middleton Funeral Home)




**James Michael (Mitch) Ewan**

**Commander, RCN / C.A.F. (Navy)**

**Born: Oct 1946, Ottawa, Ontario, Canada**

**Died: 05 Nov 2025, Houston, Texas, USA**



**EWAN, James Michel (Mitch)** - Passed away peacefully with his family at his side on 05 November 2025 in Houston, Texas. A distinguished naval officer, pioneering engineer, and devoted family man, Mitch left an indelible mark on both the military and the field of renewable energy.

Born in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada, Mitch pursued a rigorous education in Applied Science at the Royal Military College in Kingston, Ontario. His academic foundation laid the groundwork for his remarkable career that spanned continents and disciplines. Mitch served with honour in the Royal Canadian Navy, rising to the rank of Commander. During his Naval Career, he commanded three submarines and a destroyer.

After retiring from active duty, he transitioned into private industry where he held several senior executive positions. His post military career was marked by innovation and vision. For over 28 years, Mitch dedicated himself to advancing hydrogen and fuel cell technologies. He led the team that designed and built the world's first fuel cell-powered automobile. In 2001, he joined the University of Hawaii's Natural Energy Institute as the Hydrogen Systems Project Manager.

Over his 23 years tenure, Mitch played a pivotal role in developing hydrogen as a potential alternative fuel source, including the development of a hydrogen run bus system on the big island of Hawaii. His life work was to "decarbonize the world through the use of hydrogen". He was known as "Mr. Hydrogen" to his friends and colleagues. Mitch's work earned him multiple patents and widespread recognition within the scientific community.


Mitch is survived by his loving wife of 42 years, DeAnne Ewan, daughters Courtney and Caroline Ewan; brother-in-law Steven D. Wright and several nieces and nephews. May his memory bring comfort to those who knew him and inspiration to those who follow in his footsteps.

**POIRIER, Gilles Maurice** - Passed away on November 3, 2025 in the Roseway Hospital, Shelburne, NS. Born April 21, 1943, in Verdun, Quebec to a very religious family, he could not make it as a priest or a Montreal Canadians hockey player, so he joined the Merchant Marines.

After a year of schooling in Rimouski, he went to work for the Clarke Steamship Line, where he served on the SS Nova Port, MV North Gaspe and the MV North Voyageur.

In 1962, he joined the navy, signing up at HMCS Donnacona in Montreal. Having enlisted during the Cuban crisis, the navy was preparing ships in case of conflict, so he was quickly issued a uniform and sent to HMCS Cornwallis, where for the next three months he went through basic training. He graduated as an Ordinary Seaman Engineering Mechanic Standard trade and was shipped out to HMCS Stadacona where he joined the frigate HMCS Lanark. In 1963 he went to Victoria, BC and took his 3-year Naval Technical Apprenticeship course at HMCS Naden. He briefly served on both HMCS Assiniboine and HMCS Iroquois.

In April 1968 Gilles decided to serve in Submarines. He served on all of the Oberon class submarines; HMCS M Onondaga, Okanagan and Ojibwa. He was CERA onboard HMCS Ojibwa. He retired from the navy in 1986.

Upon his release, he continued to work as a submarine civilian technologist for another 20 years until his retirement in 2006.

In his later years, he was proud to be liaison/"sea daddy" to the HMCS Ojibwa Museum, providing much technical information on normal day-to-day submarine operations. He was an avid storyteller, frequently recounting many of his on and off board shenanigans.

He was a long time member of the Submariners Association of Canada.

He is survived by his wife of 51 years, Jocelyne Poirier, his son Patrick (Cavelle), his grandsons Ethan, Austin and Cameron, all from Leduc, Alberta, his daughter Natasha (Adrian) from Roseway, NS. Brothers Guy (Francine), Claude, sisters Lillianne, Claire, Celine and France (Normand), all of Quebec.

He was predeceased by his parents Lionel and Lucille Poirier, his brother Jacques and his daughter Shawna. As per his wishes, his body was donated to the Human Body Donation Program, Department of Medical Neuroscience at Dalhousie University. A Celebration of Life will be held about April 2026.




